






✓ 90% OF FAMILIES HAVE EXPERIENCED A PCS MOVE

Was your child ever without IEP related services or support?




How long were they without services?




AVERAGE WAIT TIMES FOR MILITARY RESOURCES







PERCENTAGE THAT FILED (UN)OFFICIAL CLAIM











RECOMMENDATIONS

EFMP ENROLLMENT 01

- . EDUCATE JUNIOR HEMBERS: EFMP encolinent correlated to positive special education nutrones. Junior members had lower rates of enrollment.
- . ENGAGE THE WHOLE FAMILY: EFRE should network with nonprofits and BoD/command-sponsored family programming focusing on engaging military spouses in addition to military members to increase ensulinent and reduce the impact of stigma.
- · CASE-BY-CASE EFMP [DIS]EMBOLLMENT CRITERIA: Transparency may improve encolinent

PCS TRANSITIONS 02

- . PARENTAL ADVOCACY: Parents need one-on-one assistance griot to and during PCS transitions to help advocate for their child's access to FAPE.
- IEP SUPPORT: Gaps in IEP services are highly concerning and harm hard earned progress. IEPs should be retained by the seceiving school district to mitigate setbacks.
- . REMOTE ENROLLMENT: Remote enrollment would farilitate the "warm hand off" between sending and receiving district and teacher lessening the impact of the military lifestyle on special education services.

03 KNOWLEDGE & SERVICE GAPS

- . SPECIAL EDUCATION PROTECTIONS: Military mambers need one-on-one assistance negotiating legal protections in new states to best support their children,
- . IEP SUPPORT: Military families need assistance before, during and after IEP meetings.

04 CLAIM FILING

- · ADDITIONAL STUDY: Although statistically significant findings were uncovered, studies should focus on why families choose NOT to file a claim.
- . SUPPORT STRESSED FAMILIES: The primary reason familles did not complete their claim was due to emotional stress.
